





## Players and their Responsibilities

### Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA)

Regulator, enforcer of regulations and manages sanitary issues.

#### Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada (AAFC)

Sets policy on federal programs to position industry for growth and sustainability. Provides financial and administrative support to assist industry to implement their traceability plans.

#### Provincial and Territorial Governments (AB)

Identification of sites where livestock are kept.


Implemented provincially through regulations, voluntarily and through cross compliance.

Provincial traceability regulations, i.e. age verification in Alberta

#### Responsible Administrators (CCIA)

Industry-led, not-for-profit organizations that manage regulated traceability data on behalf of CFIA.

Recommend the approval of animal indicators and communicate regulatory requirements and traceability benefits to industry. There are two other Responsible Administrators in Canada.




# Who is the Canadian Cattle Identification Agency (CCIA)?

### **Responsible Administrator:**

A not-for-profit, industry-initiated and led organization incorporated to establish a national livestock identification program and traceability initiatives to support efficient trace back and containment of serious animal health and food safety concerns.

### **Canadian Livestock Tracking System (CLTS):**

The CLTS database allows producers to record tag information pertaining to the three pillars of traceability (i.e., animal identification, premises identification and movement), as well as value-added information (e.g., age verification).




### **CCIA: Your Responsible Administrator**

### Our vision:




The agency is led by a Board of Directors representing 16 industry associations from all sectors of the livestock industry in Canada.





# Traceability Why? What? When?




## **Traceability / Why?**

### **Objectives**

The objective of the livestock traceability system is to provide timely, accurate and relevant information to reduce the impacts of a disease outbreak, food safety issue or natural disasters originating from and /or affecting livestock.

Effective traceability can better protect public health and support industry market access, competitiveness and consumer confidence.



### TRACEABILITY / HOW?

**Animal Identification:** Goats will have to have an approved **indicator** when they leave the premises where they are kept.

**Premises Identification:** PID numbers will be used to specify the site of **departure** and **destination**. It is also anticipated that a PID number will be needed to **purchase animal indicators**.

### **Reporting of Animal Movement:**


The document could be **your provincial manifest**, an **electronic form** on your phone, a **paper template**, others...



### **Proposed Amendments: Movement Document**


Movement document would accompany each load leaving the farm operation with the following information:

- PID for departure and destination sites
- Date and time animals/carcasses left the site
- Species and number of animals/carcasses
- Licence plate or other ID of conveyance




## **Proposed Amendments: Movement Document**

- Movement reporting would occur at the <u>destination</u> site when animals are received:
  - Including individual indicator numbers
  - Some exemptions: Auction markets, assembly yards, community pastures
  - Movement within the same farm would <u>not</u> be required to be reported
- Reporting to the responsible administrator would be required within 7 days




### **Expected Timeline**

- Draft regulations publication in Canada Gazette, Part 1 targeted for Spring 2019
- 75 days public comment period, followed by review (up to 12 months)
- Canada Gazette, Part 2 (in force) in 2020










### **How to Prepare: CLTS Events**


- How to report movement by group or by individual animal number;

- How to retire indicator numbers.



- Off-line feature to be launched before the end of the year.






### **CCIA: PRIVACY**


